AODAN

They are seven musicians, crossing the frontiers between three styles of music: rock, classical and trad. During the Summer of 2009, they came together to create a new style of music inspired by the hypnotic steps of traditional Breton dancing and by the melodies of central Brittany. A team of artists helped them create, around their music, a world of interwoven stories, texts, costumes and stage props. Thus was born an epic world of science fiction and magic, a melting pot of original sound and colour which has come to be known as AODAN.

VOICE:



Stefanie Devaux (Althéa): A singer, born in Germany of Slavic origins, she inherited as a young girl her great-grandfather's gypsy violin. The gift inspired a love of her family's culture which constantly brought her back to her roots even when experimenting with careers in Rock, Jazz and Classical. She settled in Brittany where she met Jonathan Dour, a meeting which sparked the first step towards Aodan's creation.

Fanch Oger (Ogam): Fanch sings in a style firmly anchored in the 'sung dance-music' tradition of Lower Brittany. A self-taught singer with eclectic musical tastes, he grew up on a diet of French songs and rock, but fell in the magic cauldron of 'festoù-noz', (the nocturnal dance, music and song celebrations which take place in Brittany until this day) during his adolescence. Jonathan was moved by his voice and charismatic presence during a musical gathering in the centre of Brittany and proposed that he start singing with Aodan, so beginning Fanch's professional music career. He was quick to make an impression on the regional music scene, and was immediately invited to participate in the 3rd creation of the famous Kreiz Breiz Akademi with Erik Marchand.

STRINGS:



Jonathan Dour (Djodan): Born into a musical family, Jonathan began his career as a fest-noz fiddler at the age of 14, playing with the group Karma and recording on four of their albums, one of which went on to win the 'Kan ar Bobl' awards of '98. At 18 he decided to dedicate himself entirely to music, continuing his classical studies at the St-Brieuc and Rennes Conservatoriums and continuing to develop his passion for traditional music with a project entitled 'Liamm' (1st place, Kan ar Bobl Awards '04). This project was a musical fusion of traditional song and lively, classical-inspired accompaniment (violin and cello), putting into practice his belief that for traditional music to flourish it must evolve. In 2008, after more than 400 festnoz concerts, Jonathan took the time to sketch out an entirely new and imaginative project, pulling on all his previous sources of inspiration; breton sung dance-music, classical harmonies and string vamping, rock and dub, and a spark of gypsy fire! Aodan was born...

Shane Lestideau (Shani): After Shane's early start to life tucked away in the heart of the Australian bush, her mother (a lover of irish and scottish music and dance) insisted on the family moving to the Blue Mountains, west of Sydney, to give her daughter the chance to learn the violin which had been stored for so many years under her bed. For the following ten years Shane received classical training whilst also pursuing her passion for traditional music, playing for her mother's ceili dances and also during a year-long stay in Ireland and Scotland as a teenager. In 2000 she continued her classical studies at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music and then specialised in violin the Boulogne-Billancourt at Conservatorium in France. Her musical career in Brittany has enabled her to remain active in all the various musical styles in which she has trained, freely exploiting musical fusions and mixed art-forms. The potent creative energy which was present from the very begining of Aodan's rehearsal sessions assured her that this project was a logical step in a long search for new sound-scapes.





Mathilde Chevrel (Matédha): Born in Upper-Brittany into a musical family, (her father was an organist), Mathilde chose the cello at the age of 10 and spent the ten subsequent years studying music the Rennes classical at Conservatorium. She then stumbled across the traditional music repertoire by chance, and discovered that it was, in fact, the melodies that she remembered from her grandfather's harmonicaplaying as a kid. It wasn't long before she was one of the only cellists in Brittany to regularly play in fest-noz concerts and also win the prestigious 'Kan ar Bobl' in '05. She went on to further enrich her musical culture with studies in baroque music and jazz. It's no surprise that it was during a fest-noz that she met Jonathan for the first time (their shared interest in classical and trad music sparked the conversation!) and so Aodan's string trio was complete.





DRUMS AND BASS:

Benoit Guillemot (loneh): As a kid, Ben learnt to love music thanks to the late-night music sessions enjoyed by his parents and friends at their family home. His first experience of the drums was playing on his dad's old kit, accompanying Platters vinyls, Chuck Berry and Jerry Lee Lewis. He tried out most styles of amplified music (punk, hard/hip hop fusion, prog rock), all his experiences taking him closer to the decision to be a professional musician. A love of jazz motivated him to do seven months of training under Césarius Alvim at Eric Le Lann's 'School of Musical Creation'. It was there that he befriended the bass player, Pierre-Yves Kermorvant, with whom he would participate in many future musical projects. Then, Ben spent three years touring France with the famous 'Freedom For King Kong' with whom he recorded the group's 4th and 5th albums. He also recorded on the 2nd album of 'Tcha K Fédérateur' before crossing paths with Jonathan and embarking upon a discovery of breton and world music with Aodan.



Pierre-Yves Kermorvant (Martouk):

Though he was born in Brittany, Pierre-Yves spent the greater part of his childhood in Nigeria D home to the afro beat! He started the bass as a teenager playing in rock groups, then took up formal music studies in various jazz institutions including the CIM Jazz de Paris and Eric Le Lannõs ÔSchool of Musical Creationõ. He went on to discover the double bass and, telling himself that no double bass player could get by without classical technique, he completed his studies in classical music at the St-Nazaire Conservatorium. Then arrived the memorable summers day when his friend Benoit introduced him to a still-forming tribe of musicians called Aodan... Even though his grandma was known for her singing of breton Ôgwerzỗ (slow airs), Pierre-Yves hadnỗt worked on the breton repertoire prior to this project. He has found himself inspired by the freedom accessible within the style to express his musical creativity in a multitude of ways.
